Author's Purpose

Use the text to answer each question below.

1. A purpose is a reason for doing something. So an **author's purpose** is the author's reason for writing something. The author's purpose could be to persuade you. This means that the author is trying to convince you of something. An author can also try to inform you or entertain you. When you're trying to decide what the author's purpose is, you should use evidence from the text, like words and phrases.

2. When authors inform you of something, they give you information or teach you to do or make something. How can you tell if a text was written mainly to inform? Here's a hint: the author will stick mostly to facts.

3. To figure out the author’s purpose, it’s important to know the difference between facts and opinions. A fact is something that’s always true. A fact can be proven. An opinion is someone’s feeling or belief that can’t be proven. People can agree or disagree with opinions. Words like “think,” “believe,” “feel,” “best,” “worst” and “must” are all clues that an author is sharing an opinion. If the author gives an opinion in a text, their purpose might be to persuade.

6. A text can have more than one purpose. For example, a funny TV commercial might persuade you to buy something and entertain you, too.

Cat owners should put bells on their cats' collars. Many cat owners don't know that pet cats sometimes hunt and kill birds. Partly because of this, some birds are becoming endangered. If cat owners attached bells to their cats' collars, they might be able to stop birds from dying. The bells would allow cats to roam freely while alerting birds that a cat is nearby.
